### From Our Rector

Every year all of our ministry members are asked to consider what God is calling the Church to do, and present proposed budgets for this good work to our Finance ministers. Then, all of us who are members of St. Timothy's are asked to prayerfully consider what we will pledge to the Church. The Finance ministers collect and tally our pledges, compare them to the budget requests made by our ministry leaders . . . and then make cuts – because we have never received enough to fund everything we believe God wants us to do!

This year all of our ministry chairs will present their budget requests, their ministry goals, as usual. These will then be collated and presented to all of us as a Vision Budget. We will know exactly what our ministry leaders believe God is calling us to do, and how much financial support this will require. If we fall short in our giving we will see exactly what is cut; if our giving/pledging is sufficient we will see exactly how the funds are put to use.

A lot of prayer, planning, and work are going into this new approach. And we hope it will be successful. When the Vision Budget is published please review every line, consider every effort to spread faith, hope, love, peace, and joy, in this community, and throughout the world.

Yes, these are tough times. We are all feeling the pinch of higher costs for fuel, utilities, food, etc. This could be God's way of making us stop and think about what's most important. Are we all about acquiring more stuff, or are we called to share a generous portion of our time, talent, and treasure to relieve need and suffering? Shall we continue to building our fortunes or build the Kingdom of God?

In his book, *The Giving Myths*, author Stephen B. McSwain says we will not be happy, we will not be fulfilled, until (by the grace of God) we are able to give away all we have and all we are. I believe he is right. We are called to "lose our lives for the Gospel." We are called to "love God with all our heart, with all our mind, with all our soul, and our neighbors as ourselves."

### Building Community

Our gospel reading for the first Sunday in September, Matthew 28:15-20, talks about the strengths and challenges of living in community. The gospel concludes with Jesus' powerful promise "where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." We live out a good portion of ministry in the individual care we give people at school and at work. However, Jesus' promise reminds us that we also engage in ministry each time we come together in his Name. Sometimes after a long day at work, it takes all our effort to get to St. Tim's for shawl ministry, choir, a Confirmation class, or a Vestry or Stewardship meeting. We fight traffic to visit a loved one who is ill or not able to get to us. The good news is that if we show up, Jesus promises that He will, too. If we give the gift of presence to each other, He will be present among us.

This fall, the youth of our parish will practice building community by giving each other the gift of presence. Youth Group President Sarah Wilson and the officers have approved a significant change in our fall calendar. The youth group will meet weekly for brunch or fun evening gatherings. This weekly meeting is not meant to add one more thing to the already-full schedules of most teens in this parish. It is an opportunity for the youth to become a true community in which they can share who they are with each other and experience Christ in their midst. All 6-12 graders are invited to gather for games, food, fellowship, discussion, movies, and prayer. We invite you, the parish, to help us build community in this area of our life together. You can volunteer to provide a meal for an evening gathering. You can join us for brunch at the Virginia Kitchen on 3rd Sundays. You can encourage youth when they show up to acolyte on Sundays, when they attend Parish Dinners, or when they offer their musical talents to the larger Church. Your presence, prayers, and encouragement are a gift to those who are just learning to claim for themselves community in Christ as a way of life.

## St. Timothy's Noteworthy Music Ministry

*I will make music to the LORD*  
(Judges 5:3)

Music is a tricky medium to pigeonhole because it represents different things to different people. Music is generally recognized as an art form, but it could also be considered a teaching method, a memory evoker, an alternative means of medicinal therapy . . . Music inspires us; it communicates to us in a manner that is both personal and universal. Appropriately, music is a mainstay of the Episcopal Church culture.

The source of this joyful noise at St. Timothy's is the Music Ministry, which houses various choirs and coordinates special music programs throughout the year. At the helm of this active and vibrant effort is Peter Waggoner, the church's Director of Music, organist, and virtuoso. Peter is in the organ pit most Sundays, setting services in motion and punctuating sermons and Bible passages with his masterful chords. A graduate of Seton Hill University with a bachelor's degree in Sacred Music, Peter has been with St. Tim's since August 2004.

Fronting the organ pit is the choir, and St. Tim's offers four to choose from. The St. Cecilia Choir sings at the 9:30 am service, highlighting a variety of anthems primarily presented in unison or two-part harmony. The St. Ambrose Choir, which performs during the 11:00 am service, sings a variety of four-part (soprano, alto, tenor, and bass) anthems ranging from Renaissance motets to spirituals.

The Music Ministry also offers the Jubilate Choir for members ages 8 and older, providing young voices with instruction in reading music, mastering vocal ranges, and interacting with a larger choral body. Jubilate Choir members are schooled in the "Voice for Life" training method and were recognized with special medals, earlier this year, by the Royal School of Church Music in Great Britain. These singers perform once a month at either the 9:30 am or 11:00 am service.

Occasionally, other musicians accompany these choirs, adding timbre and texture to the beautiful voices that waft

weekly (but not weakly) through the church sanctuary. In addition, the Music Ministry features an ambidextrous Handbell Choir, which rings at the two services once a month as well as at special events throughout the year.

"The Handbell Choir is currently full, but we're always looking for new talent for the other three choral groups," said Peter, who welcomes and encourages all ranges of musical abilities to participate. "Choirs meet once a week to practice and have the summers off," he added, noting that singing is a fun group activity and doesn't require a huge time commitment.

And speaking of fun, the St. Cecilia and St. Ambrose Choirs are attending a retreat, Sept. 12-13, at the Cathedral College of the historic Washington National Cathedral. These choirs are also known for their periodic barbeques and parties, so you could say that these groups are "social" as well as "vocal."

Annual evening concerts like the Choral Evensong for the Feast of All Saints and the Christmas Festival of Lessons and Carols have become staples for St. Tim's members. When the Choirs aren't performing, the Music Ministry sponsors special presentations featuring premiere international artists. The first of this season's Voce Concert series kicks off Dec. 14, and these events typically highlight world-renown chamber groups or individual soloists performing seasonal themes. These are top-notch productions and are a must for anyone who truly appreciates beautiful sounds organized in time.

Again, Peter could sure use an extra bass, soprano, or any range in between, if you've "got the music in you." ## Our Newest Stephen Leader



St. Timothy's has an active and growing Stephen Ministry. We are about to start our latest Stephen Ministry training class with nine new Stephen Minister trainees. I am proud to be part of the training staff, having just become a Stephen Leader. I'm even

prouder that my wife, Beth, will be in the training class and will become a new Stephen Minister.

I was blessed to be chosen and sent to Pittsburgh in August for the week-long Stephen Leader training (Leadership Training Course). Twice blessed to have paired up with an extremely supportive prayer partner (we all had one). And I was thrice blessed to receive prayers of support from our congregation while I was there. It was very uplifting. We had classes that went some days from 8:00 in the morning to 9:30 at night. We learned and sang and prayed and laughed together in a maelstrom of concentrated learning. Rather like drinking from the proverbial fire hose.

I had several very spiritual occurrences while I was there. The first was a reaction I had to the very serious and personally significant late evening training on "Caring for People Facing Death and for their Family and Friends." After the ending prayers I had to withdraw without speaking to my tablemates. I went back to my room and had to pray, but I prayed for my prayer partner and his issues. The next morning when he and I met for prayer and breakfast, he told me that a member of his family called (at the time I was praying for him) to inform him that they had decided to take exceptional steps to help correct a serious situation. This timing, we figured, had to be His will, because it was too well correlated for mere coincidence.

A second was a chance meeting in the hall with Dr. Kenneth Haugk who founded Stephen Ministry some 33 years ago. He had related (in a class that he taught) that more than a month after he had lost his mother, one of the other Stephen Ministry faculty had seen him and suggested a quiet break where they could talk. This turned out to be a one time, 45 minute, caring ministry for Dr. Haugk by the faculty member who had seen something troubling him in his appearance. And he was very comforted. When I met him in the hall, I remarked that it sounded as if there was a new type of caring relationship made possible by a one-time caring meeting. At the time, he merely acknowledged the possibility. But after the Dedication Banquet on Friday night, he stopped me as I was passing and indicated that this concept might be a new form of caring and that he seriously meant to look into it. He looked thoughtful, and I was elated.

All in all, I had a wonderful, thoughtful and spiritual time. I spent nearly 80 hours studying, working in

small groups, interacting with the inspirational faculty, and learning the basics of Stephen Leadership.

## Where Does Your E-Waste Go?

"E-waste," or electronics trash, is piling up faster than ever, according to the USA Today, which cites the Environmental Protection Agency. Americans discarded 47 million computers in 2005, up from 20 million in 1998. Less than 20% of all electronic waste is recycled, according to the EPA, while the rest ends up in landfills. Consumers saddled with old cell phones, TVs and computers have been flocking to electronics recycling events, which have sprung up in more than 1,000 communities over the past four years. A recent National Geographic magazine article highlighted that the majority of e-waste collected may actually find its way to salvage yards in developing nations, where toxins spill into the water, the air and the lungs of laborers paid a few dollars per day to extract materials. What to do? Ask your local e-waste recycler where their recycling is bound for. If a landfill or unknown, consider taking the e-waste to the hazmat center for destruction and disposal.

## Green Consumer's Guide to Avoiding Deceptive Product Labeling

It's official. It's now trendy to go green! You can walk into almost any store and find earth friendly alternatives at every turn. In fact, there's such an overload of green products you have to wonder... How did manufacturers get all of these products on the market so quick? They didn't. The surge of green products on the shelves is result of aggressive marketing targeted towards the earth conscious green consumer. As it turns out, now is a very bad time to be a green consumer and a very good time to be a green marketer. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has not revised their green marketing guidelines, known as "green guides" in 10 years.

The good news is that the green guides are due to be revised in early 2009. The bad news is that for the past 10 years, and even today, it is perfectly legal in the United States to mislead consumers with deceptive product labels, advertising, symbols, and statements. A product labeled "unscented" may contain chemical masking scents. The FTC warns to beware of vague or general claims on product labels. For instance claims such as "environmentally friendly" or "eco-safe" might look good in writing, but have no meaning or value behind them. These same products may involve animal testing or contain synthetic chemicals. A better way to determine if the green claims the manufacturer makes on the label are true is to look for proof of third party certification of these claims.
