



Dear Friends,

Pentecost occurs on June 9th this year. It is the annual celebration of the gift of the Holy Spirit. The presence of the Holy Spirit is often equated with feeling or emotion. While the Holy Spirit can cause us to be emotional, that is not the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is a person like the Son and the Father, who exists outside of creation, but moves through all people drawing them closer to God. When we are open to the Holy Spirit, then we can see the many gifts in our lives that God showers upon us. Every human and I suspect, every creature can have a relationship with the Holy Spirit, which leads them to a new place of being. It is through this relationship that we become changed. That may sound a bit esoteric, but I think it is correct. On a simpler level Pentecost is about celebrating a new relationship with the change component of God. Sometimes we refer to Pentecost as the birthday of the church. This is accurate in that the church is the vehicle by which God reforms our lives and conforms us to the Body of Christ. In other words, the church is the crucible in which we are changed. Pentecost becomes for us a celebration of our openness to being changed and the presence of that spirit of transformation in our lives. Wow, that is a lot!

Three years ago, I was in Jerusalem where I worshipped at St. George's Anglican Cathedral on Sunday morning. I was among Arab Christians who were the descendants of the first Christians we read about in the Book of Acts. It dawned on me that I was among Christians whose ancestors knew Jesus and saw him after his resurrection and it was the Holy Spirit who had led them over the centuries and kept them together as a worshipping community. That is a miracle and a sign of how even through



change, God is present. Perhaps it would be better to say especially through change, God is present. When we celebrate Pentecost this year, I encourage us to remember that the Holy Spirit is leading us to adapt to the many swift and varied changes in our lives. Even more importantly, the Holy Spirit seeks to change who we are. As people in a world where change is happening at an ever-increasing rate, our tendency is to want the church to be the place that does not change. We want the church to be an oasis of stability and peace. It can and it should be those things. But the stability and peace come from the Good News, not its packaging. Jesus' message of salvation remains the same, how we tell it does not. If we believe the Holy Spirit is real and seeks to lead us to our best lives, then we need not be afraid of change. Instead, we should fear an unwillingness to change.



Sunday Children's Service



George Frederic Handel's Flute Sonata in F Major to be the Prelude on June 30th

On the last Sunday of June, Laura Robinson will play the transverse flute for one of Handel's best-known flute sonatas: Sonata in F Major – HWV 369. The Sonata is in four movements: Grave, Allegro, Alla Siciliana and Allegro. This sonata was written between 1724-25. The piece was originally written for the block flute (a flute carved from a block of wood). This instrument is now commonly called a recorder. The difference between a recorder and transverse flute is that the recorder is held and played like an oboe or clarinet whereas the transverse flute is horizontally held or crosswise and side blown, hence the term 'transverse'.



Handel had written many chamber pieces during the 1724-25 period now believed to be in connection with his position as Music Master to Princesses Anne and Caroline, daughters of the future King George II. The royal family had heard Handel play the organ in recital at St. Paul's Cathedral in August of 1724. G.F. Handel was well known and respected as an organist and composer even then. Princess Anne became one of Handel's favorite students and became a skilled continuo-player. Continuo is a term meant to include a keyboard instrument and a bass instrument, such as a Cello.

In the Baroque period, a type of musical 'shorthand' developed which was called Figured Bass. It was the accompaniment to an individual or group of instruments. A composer would simply provide the bass line for the cello, and then a series of numbers and symbols under the bass line denoting the position and type of chord intended. Keyboard players learned how to interpret and play stylistically from figured bass as it became almost an art form unto itself. It is believed that Handel wrote out the figured bass for the Sonata in F Major as a learning exercise for his star pupil. This very same written out or 'realized' figured bass will serve as our continuo part on June 30th.

Mark your calendars now for Sunday, June 30th to hear the Flute Sonata in F Major with flautist Laura Robinson.



The Patron Saint of Baseball

A couple of weeks ago, a day in the church calendar was dedicated to the memory of St. Rita, who was canonized on May 24th 1900. She was born in Italy in 1386 to older parents known for their charity and piety, but whom did not agree to her entering a religious order when she was twelve. Instead, Rita's parents decided to marry her off to the local town watchman who was both abusive and unfaithful. Rita stayed faithful to him and bore him twin sons. After her husband was murdered, Rita persuaded her sons not to seek revenge and she finally entered an Augustine convent at Cascia where she later died in 1457.

In the 1920s, a community of religious women in West Texas invested in an oil well that did not produce any oil. Unable to get their money back, their bishop advised them to pray to St. Rita, the patron saint for hopeless causes. The sisters did, the oil well began to gush and so they got their money back and more!

Whilst waiting for success with the oil well, workers hired by the religious community built a ballfield nearby and passed the time playing baseball. When the sisters' prayers were answered, the ballplayers began to wear medals depicting St. Rita whenever they played, an incident depicted in the movie "The Rookie".

Thus St. Rita became the patron saint of "lost causes". Perhaps some local sports teams might take notice!
