
Dear Friends,

This month we conclude a yearlong celebration of Saint Timothy's first 150 years in Herndon. It has been an amazing year. Among our events we have included a rededication of the organ, renewal of marriage vows, a trip to the old Saint Timothy's, speakers, wedding dresses, ice cream social, etc. There was something for everyone. We learned about our history, met new people and celebrated a legacy of which we can be proud.

On Sunday, November 3, 2019, we conclude our celebration at the 10 am worship service with a Mass based on the liturgy in use in 1868, a proclamation delivered by Virginia State Senator, Jennifer Boysko, who represents the 33<sup>rd</sup> District, and a time capsule to be opened in 25 years at our 175<sup>th</sup> celebration. Please join us as we conclude this wonderful celebration of Saint Timothy's first 150 years in Herndon.

I also want to acknowledge and thank the 150<sup>th</sup> Celebration Team. They have worked tirelessly this year and done an amazing job planning and executing these many events. The 150<sup>th</sup> Celebration Team has been chaired by Holly Hartge. Thank you, Holly and all the members of your team, who led us through such an amazing year!

I also want to remind everyone that on the weekend of November 17<sup>th</sup> we have our Ingathering. The Ingathering is the weekend we designate each year to turn in our pledge cards for the next year. At this time, we already have about half of our pledge cards returned and I want to say a big thank you to all



those who have increased their pledge. An overwhelming majority raised next year's pledge over last year's and the increase is around 15%. That is a tremendous success and the second year in a row that we have had such good results. If you have not turned in your pledge yet, I ask you to pray about how you can help Saint Timothy's accomplish its goals for 2020. Saint Timothy's has had the need for part time clergy assistance for several years now and with your help we may be able make that real this year.

Finally, I can provide an initial update on the success of our Capital Campaign, *Growing Saint Timothy's: Another 150 years*. We are doing great! Although we are moving more slowly than we anticipated, those members we have contacted have really been very generous. We now have about 25

pledges with a total of over \$200,000 pledged from these few pledges. We have approximately another 100 pledging units to contact and will be doing so as we are able.

There is a great feeling at Saint Timothy's on many levels and I am so grateful to be part of this dynamic and growing community. Allow me to say thank you again to everyone who makes this community so vibrant and fun!

### New to Giving? A few thoughts for those new to financial giving to the St. Timothy's and pledging

Giving money to the church is a spiritual practice. The connection between money and spiritual work, though, can be confusing and even hurtful. Society has so many mixed messages about why we should give, how much, and what the money is for. Here are some thoughts about giving at St. Timothy's that I hope will be helpful.

Giving is just that...giving. It's not an obligation or a contract. You can come to church your whole life and never give a cent. The church will not shame you. At some point, though, people who value the church start to realize that they want to give and that giving brings them joy.

#### Why give?

When we see the abundance of blessings in our lives, we often want to share them. If someone gave us a bunch of great food, we might throw a party, invite our friends and share the gifts. Giving to the church is one way, among many, to share the blessings we receive. We often say in the church, "It all comes from God". So giving back to God is a way to say "thank you". Giving is also a way that we express our trust in God's generosity. We might not have a lot of extra income to share. When we share anyway, it's a way to say, "I trust that what I need will be provided". Many of us find that when we give, even in lean times, we still have more than enough. Giving can also be fun and joyful. It's a great feeling to be generous.

#### Why give money to the church?

There are lots of charitable organizations out there doing good work. Giving to the church community is different than other charitable giving. When we give to the church, we are supporting good work and keeping the ministries of the church available (usually for free). We are also participating in that community and letting that community shape us. When we offer our gifts to the church, we are less interested in "return on investment" or "results". We are surrendering some of our wealth to the community and then letting the community guide, support and inspire us in ways that are often beyond our expectations.

#### **How do I start giving?**

Start where you are. You may be ready to give 10% of your income right now. Great! Some people start by putting a few dollars or a check in the collection plate when it passes by at worship services. Maybe they make an online gift once in a while. The "loose offering" is an important part of our church budget. Others start right away with a regular commitment to the church called a "pledge".

#### Why pledge?

At some point, as noted earlier, we want to give more. We start to feel that giving just when we have extra or when we feel like it is not helping us grow spiritually. There is a leap of faith and a deepening of faith that can occur when we make a commitment to give. Instead of giving out of what we have "left over", we move toward giving of our "first fruits", taking our donation to the church off the top and then using the rest for our other needs. Each fall, we invite everyone to make a financial pledge over the next calendar year. You pay that pledge weekly, monthly, quarterly or annually...whatever works for you.

#### How much should I give?

The Bible talks of a tithe, a holy standard of giving, which is 10% of what we have, back to God. There are many at St. Timothy's who give 10% or greater. There are many parishioners who are also working toward that goal. Start giving at a level that feels hard but not impossible. Focus more on the percentage of your income rather than a dollar amount. Stretching beyond where we think we can give often has the result of showing us that there is more than we thought. God provides.

#### What if I can't pay my pledge?

Again, there is no penalty or shame. If your financial situation changes (up or down) and you want to adjust your pledge, just contact the church office and let us know.

#### How does the church use my pledge information?

The amount of your pledge is known only to the treasurer, the bookkeeper and Fr. Rich. Your confidentiality is very important. We share how much has been pledged in the congregation overall with the leadership of the church. They use that information to make a budget for the coming year.

It helps us greatly to know how much we hope to receive.

#### What do you do with the money I give?

It costs a lot of money to run a church. We have a facility, staff, utilities and other overhead costs. We give away a lot of money to the ministries that help others. St. Timothy's contributes Time, Talent and Treasure to local, state, national and world level to help support people in need, including: The Closet and hypothermia shelter at the local level; Dungannon at the state level; the Lakota Mission at the national level; and the Haiti Mission at the world level. We also give money to our Episcopal diocese which actually helps us, because those bigger networks provide a lot of support and resources to our church and other local parishes. If you have questions about how we are spending the money you give, please come to the Annual Parish Meeting on January 12, 2020, read our articles in the Church publications or call Fr. Rich. We occasionally post updates on the website and in the newsletter, too.

#### What's the first step?

Pray. Pray. Pray for God's guidance in your giving. When you encounter obstacles or resistance, don't let yourself feel bad. Just add that to your prayers and let God's grace help you through it. Contact the church. We'll be happy to talk about these things with you without putting any pressure on you. Again, it's all about giving with joy and gratitude.

Thanks for reading. I hope these thoughts have been helpful to you and that you will, with God's help, experience the grace and joy that can come through financial giving to your church.

One of the players in this group is in the 10<sup>th</sup> grade, two are in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade and the youngest, Elizabeth, is in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. The father of Rebecca and Elizabeth, Paul Schaaf, is married to Ruth Schaaf, a Violist with the National Symphony; this is truly a musical family! The ensemble will be playing the Church Sonata Opus 3, No. 2 in D Major of Arcangelo Corelli (1653-1713). The Church Sonata form, or Sonate de Chiesa, was one of Corelli's greatest contributions to instrumental music in the late 17<sup>th</sup> century. Corelli's music later influenced the compositions of Antonio Vivaldi and ultimately the music of George Frideric Handel.

In addition to the Corelli work, the Adult Choir will join the ensemble to sing Mozart's Ave Verum.

Plan now to arrive early on November 24<sup>th</sup>, as the Prelude will begin at 9:45 am.
























#### Seeking Candidates for Vestry

The elections will be held in January, with results announced at the Annual Parish Meeting on January 12, 2020.

#### Ministry Description of a Vestry Member

I want to share what I see as the Ministry Description of a Vestry Member. By no means is this list complete and some items are intentionally left undefined. I have come to understand that Ministry Descriptions must be flexible because that is what one needs to do ministry in the church. It is also one of the reasons that we call it a Ministry Description rather than a Job Description. There are differences between the two. First, in ministry, there needs to be room for the Holy Spirit, so we leave some space for adaptation and flexibility. Second, ministry is a calling from God and primarily about matters of the soul. So what follows is a Ministry Description that should not be equated with a Job Description. Nevertheless, I hope it provides the congregation with a better understanding of what

the role of a Vestry person is and what a Vestry person does.

#### Purpose:

Provide leadership to the congregation and support the Rector

Further the mission\* of the church and help implement the vision\*\* of the church

Provide oversight and direction to various church committees and ministries. Each Vestry member is a Liaison to at least one committee or ministry.

Empower others in their ministries

#### Responsible to:

Congregation, one another, ourselves, the Rector and Jesus.

#### **Specific Practices:**

Participate in spiritual life/prayer life of the church

Attend church weekly and special services Monthly meetings are the third Tuesday at 7:00 p.m.

Communication with the congregation—get the word out!

Attend church events and programs as often as possible

Participation on committees

Support clergy and other leaders in their ministries

Be engaged in new learning about the church and faith

#### Desired result:

Ministries and administration be in good working order

Church growing and expanding Sense of deepening church's community Learn more about self, church and faith

#### Time Commitment:

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$  hour meeting each month plus participation in church activities

Special meetings as necessary Attendance at Vestry Mutual Ministry

Review and retreats

Participate in as many special events and church programs as possible

Church commitment is greater than other "activities"

#### Skills Talents Qualifications:

Follower of Jesus

Must be a pledging member of the church and committed to proportional giving

Friendly and open-minded

Willingness to work as a team

Willingness to welcome new members to the community

Willingness to learn new ways of thinking and to try new methods

#### History and Harvest

At first, I was going to name this article "History Repeats Itself" after re-reading the epistle passage assigned for October 11<sup>th</sup> this year, namely St. Paul's second letter to Timothy while in prison in

Rome. My question was "Why do we not learn from the results of an original event or even from the repetition throughout the ages?" but I feared that I would get too political and abandoned that idea in favor of Paul's exhortations to Timothy to lead a full Christian life as a soldier for Christ, as a Christian athlete and worker while remembering Jesus Christ not only for His sacrifice, but also for the continued presence as the Risen Christ and the need to continue to explain this truth to anyone who would listen.

While considering this, I recalled an old hymn, "Fight the Good Fight", written by J.S.B Monsell in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century. John Samuel Bewley Monsell lived from 1811 – 1875 and was a prolific writer of poetry and hymns. He was an Irish Anglican deacon and priest, educated at Trinity College, Dublin, where he received a Doctor of Letters in 1856.

Although some of his children died at an early age, (one son, Thomas died in a shipwreck at age 18, on his way to the Crimean War) one daughter became a respected artist, as did a granddaughter, Elinor Darwin, nee Monsell. His brother, Charles, was also a clergyman who married Harriet O'Brien. She re-founded the Community of St. John the Baptist at Clewer near Windsor, U.K. Through her work, John Monsell became involved with the Oxford Movement and was an admirer of its founder, Edward Pusey. He also maintained regular correspondence with William Gladstone, who was Prime Minister and advisor to Queen Victoria, and under him many social reforms were introduced, as well as some quite controversial decisions which have never really been resolved or brought peace between Ireland and England


Monsell published eleven volumes of poems and about 300 hymns, including "Worship the Lord in the Beauty of Holiness" and "Sing to the Lord a Joyful Song". Appropriate for this time of year is a hymn published in 1866 based on Psalm 65. The first verse reads:

"Sing to the Lord of harvest, Sing songs of love and praise; With joyful hearts and voices Your alleluias raise.
By Him the rolling seasons
In fruitful order move,
Sing to the Lord of harvest
A joyous song of love.".

I could have written about the disastrous dictatorship of the Emperor Nero and his misguided destruction of Rome etc. but on reflection, Paul's exhortation for Timothy to "Fight the good fight" and the joy of hymns and poetry to remind us of God's gifts to us, seem much more appropriate and

offer less controversial thoughts than those I might have initially pursued. Nevertheless, history does tend to repeat itself and my question is "Why do we not learn from it?"
