

All Saints Day and the Culmination of St. Timothy's 150th Anniversary Celebration















150th Anniversary Final Celebration

All Saint's Day November 3rd, 2019 was a joyous celebration of St. Timothy's 150 years. Fr. Rich celebrated the liturgy using the 1789 Book of Common Prayer and Roger Long led the choir and congregation in beloved and historic hymns. Fr. Rich and the readers impressed the congregants with their expert translation of the prayers by successfully pronouncing the confusing "f" printed in the handout with the "s" sound as was traditional during the time of our church founding. We all participated in the 19th century prayers and liturgy and the inspiration of centuries-old worship. Thankfully, Fr. Rich spared us the multi-hour sermon common during the 1800s.

St. Timothy's was blessed to welcome former members and longtime friends including The Rev. Ralph Bayfield, The Rev. Leslie Chadwick and former members who had moved away but returned to join us in the celebration. Virginia State Senator Jennifer Boysko presented a legislative proclamation recognizing St. Timothy's 150th year. Items from the Time Capsule created to mark the anniversary were displayed including a Washington Nationals World Series Championship t-shirt and notecards with remembrances by parishioners of meaningful times at St. Timothy's. The Time Capsule will be stored safely for opening in November 2043.

Following the 10:00 am service, the Anniversary Committee served a festive brunch for the congregation. The brunch was well attended with parishioners enjoying fellowship and friends.

With the leadership of Chair Holly Hartge, the Anniversary Committee members Shon Beury, Carmela Condro, Helen Guest, Carolyn Hamm, Elaine Horsfield, Bob Kimmel, Maria LaWalt, Mindy Rohrbach and Sandy Wright sponsored several events throughout the year to highlight church history and traditions. Events the committee organized included: a Choral Evensong and Rededication of the Tracker Organ, a Visit to St. Timothy's Past, held at the former church building which is now the Herndon Masonic Lodge, on two

occasions, a photo display of parishioners through the decades, recognition of those married at St. Timothy's and a renewal of wedding vows, an ice cream social (long a St. Timothy's tradition) and a talk by The Honorable Tom Rust former Herndon Mayor and Virginia Delegate, discussing the changes in Herndon since the 1950s. The church website www.saint-timothys.org, has a recording of the presentations at the Herndon Masonic Lodge as well as Tom Rust's discussion. The recordings can be found in the History section of the 'About' tab.

The Anniversary Committee is grateful to all who participated in making the commemorative events a success and for joining us in marking St. Timothy's 150th year. With God's help, may we look forward to another 150 years in Herndon.

Special Instrumental Music for Advent and Christmas

We have had a busy fall with rehearsals this year with our new emphasis on Instrumental Ministry. It began with the introduction of the St. Timothy's String Ensemble on November 24th.

On December 1st, Natalie Dubishar, French Horn, will play a Church Aria by Alessandro Stradella (1642-1682). A middle Baroque period composer, Stradella is best known for his operas and other solo vocal compositions. This horn piece, composed in 1667, is an arrangement of a Church Song or Aria.

On December 8th, we will hear selections from the Flute Sonata in B Minor, by G. F. Handel. Laura Robinson will play the flute accompanied by Alexis Roque, cello.

On December 15th, our bell choir will offer a beautiful setting of the Finnish Advent folksong "Lost in the Night" by Cathy Moklebust. This is scored for Bells and Violin - an unusual combination. Ellen Grace Burke will be our Violinist that Sunday.

For Christmas Eve, we will present pieces especially arranged for Organ and Instruments.

Laura Robinson will perform three arrangements for Flute and Organ by Michael Barker: "Twas in the Moon of Wintertime", "Cold December Flies Away" and "The Wexford Carol".

Alexis Roque will perform three arrangements for Cello and Organ by Raymond Haan: "Of the Father's Love Begotten", "Unto Us a Child is Born" and "Christmas Dawn" (based on a German folksong).

To complete our instrumental offering for Christmas Eve, the St. Timothy's Bell Choir will perform arrangements of lessor known but familiar Christmas Carols.

During our Christmas Eve 7:00 and 10:00 pm services, the Adult Choir will sing three anthems, including one anthem for 3-part ladies' voices and Flute, "Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day", arranged by Don M. Dicie. The distinctive flute obbligato adds a cheerful addition to this piece!

Please plan to arrive thirty minutes early for the 7:00 pm and 10:00 pm traditional services on December 24th, because the musical preludes will start at 6:30 pm and 9:30 pm.

Security Statement from Our Rector

I am writing to make you aware that we have had several attempts by scammers to solicit money from some parishioners while posing as me. First, I will never ask for money from individual parishioners via email. If I ask individuals for money it will generally be in person. I might solicit the entire congregation for funds in an email, but that will be for St. Timothy's or a special mission drive, which would not be covered by our line item budget. Second, I only use one email address for my work: rbardusch@saint-timothys.org. These scammers are creating emails that contain my name and look official, but they are not. I will only communicate with you using the above email, no others.

Finally, I want you to know that Saint Timothy's computer system has not been hacked. We believe that the scammers are getting the information off our web page. Additionally, when an individual email is hacked it does not give access to our computer system. They are separate. The information contained on our computer system such as financial and baptismal records is protected by encryption, virus software, and fire walls. We make every effort keep these protections up to date.

Always be careful when someone, anyone, asks for money or information over the Internet. That is not an appropriate conduit for either. If you are in doubt about the genuineness of a request from me, please call the office at 703-437-3790.

Odd Thoughts

I do not know why, on this Sunday in mid-November, I started to think about some redundant words or some that are not in general use in this modern age. Perhaps being in the shower when the first of the words arose – "dandruff" (stop laughing!) – but I got to thinking of others like "typist, bus conductor, vacuum flask, knickers (short trousers for boys here in the U.S. and underwear in the U.K.!). For some reason these thoughts led me to think of old customs used in

Advent and over the Christmas season. I often reminisce about the much less commercial season of my childhood when there was such an air of expectation and potential surprise.

My young years spread across the six years of WWII, but even with all the shortages and the absence of my father who served in the R.A.F, my mother and my grandparents managed to make the Holy Days very special. No Advent Calendars, but slow preparations at church and school, often interrupted by air raids, brought the important date nearer and nearer. No carols before Christmas Eve and little or no repetitive "seasonal" music in the stores, but the practices in Sunday School for the Annual Nativity Play, plus those for a traditional pantomime in the primary school which was a lot of fun, set the anticipation of a joyful time.

I played the Fairy Queen in a production of "Sleeping Beauty" in a cut down lacy night gown from one of the teachers, a cardboard crown covered with some old wallpaper and a wand made from a shortened broom handle!

My brother and I saved our pennies given as pocket money for small tasks we did around the house during October and November in order to buy a gift for my mother and father after he returned safe and sound, thank God, in 1946. That year we bought him a hammer and a potted hyacinth bulb for my mother which I hid under my bed. There is no doubt that she knew what she was getting as to my dismay it bloomed on December 21st! The heavy perfume gave the game away even if the carpet cleaner did not!

Fast forward to much later years around 1990 when I had returned from the U.S. to help my parents who were declining in health and needed extra support. I was privileged to attend several performances of the "Mystery" plays. These plays originated during the Middle Ages in an attempt to "educate" the common people who could not read or had no access to books. They were geared to audience participation in terms of cheers and boos and were usually performed in the beds of carts which brought farm produce to the towns. Chester and

York Cathedrals have maintained regular performances. In Chester, they are performed every five years, the most recent was in the cathedral in 2018 and the plans are already made for 2023! In York, they are performed on the Feast of Corpus Christi, sixty days after Easter in May or June (there is a short YouTube video of the 2012 performance available).

I usually went to All Hallows by the Tower (founded in 675 A.D.) in London. The plays were performed in rotation with other more modern versions including a musical version called "Fan the Flames". The range of the scenes went from the Creation to the Nativity, although there were others that went further to the Crucifixion, but it is believed that this was a later addition perhaps in the late 17th century.

Apart from an introductory prayer and a final Advent hymn there was no religious component, but I feel sure that people who could not read learned landmark episodes in the Scriptures just as they did from the lovely painted walls in many medieval churches, some of which have been revealed and restored, having been covered by a thick lime wash during the Reformation. More about those in a future article.

All this from the consideration of DANDRUFF! Who knows where thoughts may lead?!
