



As we begin the Season of Lent, I would like to offer a theme for your consideration. Let me preface that theme with a little background theology. Lent is not a time of self-abasement for the sake of punishing ourselves or for making us feel bad. Nor is it a time to dwell on past wrongs; rather, it is a time to reconcile and move on from those failures. Lent is a time to prepare for the celebration of the resurrection. It is a time to free ourselves from those parts of our lives that weigh us down. It is a time to free ourselves—or rather let God free us—from our brokenness. The resurrection is the foundation of the entire Christian enterprise.

Therefore, Lent is a time of preparation to celebrate the resurrection. Granted, part of the preparation is self-examination and repentance, but it is for the purpose of moving deeper into the reality of the new life given in Christ Jesus, not for the purpose of making ourselves feel bad. It may be that by facing our own reality we do feel bad, but that is not where we are to remain, nor is it the desired end. The desired end is to move deeper into an abundant life given to us by God. The purpose of Lent is to free is so that God's love can shine through us.

That is the background for what I want to propose as a theme for this Season of Lent. I propose that we take as a theme "doing for the kingdom". Allow me to explain: if we want to free ourselves and move more deeply into the abundant life given to us through Jesus' resurrection, we need to do more than think about it. Reflection is good, but it is only a tool to prepare the way. If we are going to change some aspect of our lives, whether by giving up or



taking on, we need to do more than just think about it. We must do it. We must practice what we want to see happen. It is like learning any new skill; reading the manual or reflecting on it will prepare our minds, but there is a point when we just need to go out and do it.

The discipline of Lent is a practice, not a reflection. It is only through the practice that we move to a deeper place. I will incorporate this theme into my sermons and ask you to incorporate it into your Lenten Discipline. So, in preparation for Lent, I want to begin by asking some questions. What do you need to do that you have been thinking about? How do you need to move forward by means of

practice? And, what do you need to repair in order to enter more fully into the new life ushered in by Christ's Resurrection?"

Rethinking Lent

Preparing for Easter is a highly personal endeavor. Many of us were raised with the idea of giving up chocolate or other enjoyable food to draw closer to God. While fasting can be a powerful entry point for self-examination, others may benefit from active learning. For Lent this year, we in Stewardship invite everyone to consider a new Lenten practice namely, refocus your time and talent to build your faith.

By time, we mean participating in the life of the Church—such as attending church, learning more about the Bible and participating in various ministries. Talent indicates your capabilities or strengths. Partnering with others gives us a chance to exercise our strengths and lift each other up.

Using our time and talents looks different for each person and each community. For example, here are several opportunities at St. Timothy's for you to consider:

- Read the Bible every day and attend an Adult Christian Education class or Bible study
- ❖ Volunteer at a local non-profit organization e.g. The Closet
- ❖ Lead a coffee hour team for a Sunday
- Participate in a Shawl Ministry meeting
- ❖ Attend a church service that is not your usual service
- Meet a new person at church and talk after the worship service
- Join the Newcomers Team
- ❖ Join the Communications Team
- Become an usher
- ❖ Take on a one-time job with Buildings and Grounds

The Time and Talent components of stewardship give us opportunities to encourage each other. The deeper relationships that result enable us to share both our joys and burdens. We hope you can find a way to use your time and talent to build your faith during this coming Lenten season.

We encourage you to listen for ministry announcements during 5 Sundays in March. Our sign-up sheets for ministries can be found in the Narthex or you could contact the office.

Vestry Notes

Keith Sinclair attended our February meeting to inform the Vestry that he is working with Bill Odio to expedite the ratification and confirmation of our third Trustee with the Fairfax County Circuit Court. Once that is concluded, we can move forward with the refinancing of St. Timothy's mortgage with Main Street Bank at a lower interest rate.

The Vestry is holding a retreat on Saturday, February 22nd to discuss the four issues we are focusing on this year, namely, Christian Education, the Newcomers Ministry, the Latino Ministry and Finance. We will also discuss any gaps that may exist in our Pastoral Care Ministry and our ongoing Capital Campaign.

Kent Miller spoke to the Vestry about Stewardship. During March, we are focusing on Time and Talent. He reminded us that Stewardship is a yearlong activity which includes pledging, donations, Capital Campaign giving and Endowment funding.

The Vestry needs to appoint 2 delegates and an alternate to our Diocesan Convention which meets in Arlington on November 12th to the 14th. Their role will be to represent and vote on St. Timothy's behalf. We are soliciting names from which we will appoint 3 members at our next Vestry meeting.

Update on Backpack Meals for Clearview Elementary School: Our Valentine's Day Operation has been completed and our partnership continues.



While it is easy to get caught up in the cards, chocolate and flowers for Valentine's Day with our families and sweethearts, we at St. Timothy's came together and remembered as Christians that we have others to help as well. For many kids in our area, their worry is not about how many valentines they will get on Valentine's Day, but if they will have dinner that night or breakfast the next morning. Together, we stood up and made a tangible impact in our community.





Due to your generous donations of food and time, in two short weeks we collected, packed and delivered nearly 200 backpack meals to kids in need at Clearview Elementary School (198 to be exact). It was incredible to see the quick work in packing we made between the services.



The children enjoyed making personalized valentines to include in the packs. We also owe a huge thanks to Wegmans who supported our program for a second time with donations of 500 cans of soup and large amounts of macaroni and cheese, oatmeal and cereal bars. A heartfelt thank you to Wegmans! Our success would not have been possible without all of their support and help.



We have supported this program three times now and continue to receive positive feedback. Parishioners appreciated the relevant, local community support we provided and everyone enjoyed the easy ability to bring in food and lend a quick hand packing a meal. We have pledged a continued partnership and



support of this program at Clearview Elementary School with three donations annually. In discussion with our contact at Clearview, the Service Ministry has identified Memorial Day weekend as our next opportunity to donate to cover the extra break when kids do not have access to school meals.

Thoughts from your CE Director

Happy March! Coming up this month is a Eucharist class on March 29th, so I want to answer some common questions.

At what age should my child receive Communion?

This is a question many parents ask as they are striving to raise their children in the church. Once we are baptized, regardless of our age, we are welcome to receive Communion. Our Book of Common Prayer (p. 858) indicates that, at the time of Baptism, we receive the inward and spiritual grace of union with Christ in his death and resurrection, birth into God's family (the Church), forgiveness of sins, and new life in the Holy Spirit. Once a child is born into God's family, that child is welcome to participate in Communion. This represents a change for many of us as parents since we may have had to wait until Confirmation or other instructional opportunities before taking our first Communion.

How do I know if my child is ready for Communion?

Has your child asked? Have you asked your child if he/she wants Communion? Does your child imitate your actions at the altar rail? Does your child watch what you do at the rail? Has your child put his/her hands out to receive? These are good signs that your child is ready.

How does my child learn about the Eucharist?
First and foremost, children learn from attending church. Here they can see and be a part of the service and begin to understand the sacrament they are seeing. Additionally, from your actions and discussions with your child, he/she sees that Communion is important and that participating in Communion is something you do on a regular basis. Children recognize your reverence at the altar from your body language (kneeling, placing your hands one over the other). For them to imitate you and your actions indicates that they have some understanding of the Eucharist's importance. This is

evident in the youngest of our children, even before they have had any formal Christian education.

Finally, your child will learn about the Eucharist at his or her Christian Formation class. These classes help our children understand the Eucharist and its meaning. Children grasp this meaning at different ages, and for this reason, the church does not dictate when a child takes his/her first Communion.

If you would like a more formal Eucharist class, please consider attending our "Eucharist for All" class on March 29th from 11:30-2:30. Lunch will be provided. 


























Lent - Spring

While reading a "Little Book of Prayers" I received many years ago, I came upon this prayer by Julian of Norwich, which seemed to me to reflect the season(s) in which we find ourselves in March this year. It reads: -

"Be a gardener,

Dig a ditch,

Toil and sweat,

And turn the earth upside down

And seek the deepness

And water the plants in time.

Continue this labor

And make sweet floods to run

And noble and abundant fruits to spring.

Take this food and drink

And carry it to God

As your true worship.

Lent is a time of preparation, of meditation and prayer, of reordering the garden of our life in order to reap the harvest of God's eternal love for us.

"Giving up" is the general motto of Lent. Although there is merit in the discipline of giving up material things and donating one's time and money to good causes etc. are worthy efforts and intentions, in order to receive the real Harvest, we should perhaps consider the following prayer attributed to St. Ignatius Loyola:

"Take, O Lord, and receive all my liberty, my memory, my understanding and my entire will - all that I love and possess. To you, O Lord, I return it. All is Yours, dispose of it wholly according to Your will. Give me Your love and Your grace for this is sufficient for me"

I got around to thinking about "giving up" and thought how wonderful it would be if everyone could give up ambition, anger, greed, spite, insult, defamation, prejudice, violence and malice, all of which would be far more effective to further God's purpose and love than abstinence from chocolate, treats, pleasures of all kinds or doing nothing which is never an option in my mind!

However, I would not want to fall into the chasm described in George Bernard Shaw's "Man and Superman" in which he states "Self-sacrifice enables us to sacrifice other people without blushing". I have never quite known how to address this sobering thought. Violence and war immediately spring into mind as the sacrifice of life and limb often tries to justify questionable victory and denial of "treats' begs the question of whether the potential monetary saving is actually donated to those in need.

The first sentence of the above paragraph calls to mind a passage annually recited at the Remembrance Day service at the Cenotaph in Whitehall, London, with its reminder of the greatest sacrifice of all. It is written by Rudyard Kipling whose only son was killed in WWI and reads:

"The tumult and the shouting dies -

The captains and the kings depart –

Still stands Thine ancient Sacrifice,

An humble and a contrite heart

Lord God of Hosts be with us yet.

Lest we forget –lest we forget
