
Dear Friends,

Every cloud has a silver lining. The pandemic has been difficult for us as individuals and as an institution. For many of us, it has felt very confining. We have been limited to our homes except for necessary trips for food and medical care. We aren't used to this and it has not been fun for any of us. And because we have been limited in our actions, so has Saint Timothy's. The life blood of our parish is what our people do. That is why I have tried to highlight some of the things we are doing as a parish. Individuals preparing food, writing cards, making phone calls, providing inspiration and many other acts of compassion and connection. Even when we are isolated behind closed doors, we find ways to reach out.

It serves as a reminder that we are more than a building. We are a Body. Each one of us is part of Saint Timothy's that contributes to our amazing witness in the world. While having a building makes the connecting and reaching out easier, not being able to go to the building does not make us less of a Body. It is good to remember this on occasion.

So, what is the silver lining here?

The silver lining is what I saw last Sunday at our online streaming during the Peace. I experienced more of what we need going forward: people sharing God's love even though they weren't in the same room. Don't get me wrong, someday we will return to our building and I look forward to that. But what I saw is that we are more than just a



building. We are a Body that extends way beyond Herndon and Reston. Our Body is global and so is the mission field. We can't go back to worshiping God in one room cut off from the rest of the world. We have to put our worship out into the world and in the 21st Century, that means livestreaming and welcoming people who are not physically present in our dedicated worship space. Going forward, if we don't share our worship beyond the one room in which we gather, then it is as if the Pandemic is still forcing us to stay at home behind closed doors.

I don't know yet how this will develop going forward, but I do know that it has to go forward. We live in a new world and we need to get to know that new world. In a very pragmatic way, that is what we celebrate in the resurrection: new life, new world, and a new way of being. When Jesus was raised to

new life, he was given a completely new type of Body. After this enforced sabbatical from our way of gathering in person to worship, we are going to have a new type of Body. Just like in the example of Jesus' Resurrection, it doesn't mean the old body is lost. Rather, it means the old body gets a fuller dimension. It can be in more than one place at a time. That is how Saint Timothy's Body will be: in Herndon and around the world. I guess it is more than a silver lining; it is a glimpse of Heaven.

Supporting LINK

The St. Timothy's family is there for our LINK neighbors. Thank you to the many donors and volunteers who have sent financial donations, dropped off donations for the LINK pantry,

volunteered to help pack and deliver food and to translate for our Latino neighbors. Your help has made a significant difference to our community.

Since early April, the need for food assistance has increased over 500%. In a typical week, LINK serves about twenty families. In mid-April, LINK served over 130 families in a week and has increased deliveries from five to seven days a week. This is possible with the extraordinary generosity of individual donors and our corporate partners. Financial donations have allowed LINK to purchase protein for the families and supplement nonperishable food. The need will continue and you're encouraged to donate and volunteer when you are able. Most needed items include: Jelly, Peanut Butter, Hearty Soups, Canned Meats (tuna, chicken, etc.), Pasta Sauce, Canned Tomatoes (diced type), Canned pasta (like Chef Boyardee), cereal, Hamburger/Tuna Helper, snack items for kids, Toiletries (toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, shampoo, conditioner, soap), toilet paper and paper towels.

Yet suddenly a gleam of light through thinning leaves


Puts my faltering steps much more at ease





Vestry Notes – April 21st Meeting

We are grateful to our Communications team headed by Catherine Lamoureux and John Druitt who were responsible for producing a live Sunday service on Zoom and Facebook on April 19th. We had approximately 106 people in attendance and Alyssa, our Christian Education Director, reports that 16 children participated in Sunday school online. We hope more of you will be able to join our virtual morning worship services in the future.

We discussed possible ways to increase contact not only with current church members but with potential new members. For example, a sign on our property could display our website and we could send mailings to homes or post more information on Facebook. We also discussed possibly adding a Saturday evening English language service in the future or an occasional outdoor service.

We thank our treasurer, Duane Hartge, for tirelessly working with Main Street Bank and for viewing numerous videos from the Diocese to adequately inform us about the Federal Government's Paycheck Protection Plan. I electronically signed the completed document from the bank on Monday morning, April 20th and the money was deposited in our account that evening. We applied for \$48,700 to pay exclusively for payroll for two months. After eight weeks, we will apply for loan forgiveness offered by the program.

We voted to elect Sandy Wright and Bob Beury as our delegates to attend the November Diocese Convention.

Alex Schumann is devising a plan to identify church members who need help during this pandemic. At the same time, she hopes to locate church members who are willing to volunteer their services in this effort.

Andy is researching the possible use of solar panels as an energy source.

I will continue to make phone or email contact with church members to find out how people and families are managing during this crisis. Please keep in contact with other church members to let them know that you are thinking of them.

CARES Act Charitable Giving Incentives

Excerpts include the following:

There is a new charitable deduction for taxpayers who do not itemize. Beginning in 2020, individuals can deduct \$300 in charitable contributions from their gross income even if they do not itemize their deductions. Donations must be made in cash to a charity. Gifts of appreciated securities and gifts to a donor advised fund or supporting organization do not qualify. Although the permissible amount is modest, it is a new benefit available to many donors.

Donors who itemize their deductions can usually deduct cash contributions up to 60% of their adjusted gross income. For 2020, that cap is lifted and donors contributing cash to charity may deduct up to 100% of their income, a significant tax savings for anyone able to contribute larger amounts. Again, this is only for gifts of cash and only for gifts made directly to charity (not to donor-advised funds or supporting organizations).

The CARES Act eliminates required minimum distributions (RMDs) from many retirement plans in 2020. Some donors have been using their RMDs for tax-advantaged charitable gifts by making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) directly to charity. Under the CARES Act it is still possible for donors who are 70½ or over to contribute up to \$100,000 directly to a charity without paying tax on the distribution.

Vegetarian Breakfast Burrito (Serves 4)

Ingredients: 1 cup dry black beans, 1 red bell pepper, 1/2 avocado, chopped lettuce, 4 tortillas

- 1. Rinse & pick over 1 cup of dry black beans.
- 2. In a small saucepan add black beans and cover with 2 inches of water. Bring to a simmer for 2-3 hours until soft (time depends on how old the beans are). Salt cooked beans to taste.
- 3. Cut the red bell pepper into long strips, discarding the stem and seeds. Cook in a dry pan over medium heat turning peppers occasionally until the skin is lightly charred but the flesh still has some crunch to it.
- 4. With a sharp knife, cut a ripe avocado in half lengthwise, avoiding the pit in the center. Holding the avocado in your hands, twist in opposite directions to separate. Rub a cut lemon on the exposed flesh of the half with the pit, store in a reusable container, then place in the fridge for another recipe. Use a spoon to scoop out the flesh of the remaining half from the avocado shell. Slice in 4 long pieces.
- 5. Assemble tortillas by stuffing with beans, peppers, chopped lettuce, and an avocado slice.

A note from the Stewardship of Creation: Bring your own reusable cloth produce bags to avoid the thin plastic bags in the vegetable section of your grocery store.

Remove our shoes Press hands to soil Sift grains between fingers


Gentle palms
