


Dear Friends,

September is the month when we usually gear up for the program year. It is typically an exciting and hopeful time for me. I look forward to the buzz of new beginnings and expectations of the school year. This September, however, feels different to me, as I am sure it does for many of you, too. While some of our programming has been able to move onto Zoom, other pieces of our program have been unable to do so because of their nature. Most importantly we have not been able to gather in person for many months now and our connections are strained. This is a difficulty for communities such as ours, which are built on interpersonal interactions.

While we continue in a difficult time, not just for us, but for the whole nation, I want us to remember that we are still a body. While many of us feel isolated and cut off, we are still connected. Although we have not met in person, our pastoral care team has been unable to visit people and while daily interactions among staff and members have been curtailed, we have successfully managed to keep most pieces of ministry functioning. We continue to do outreach, deliver food, operate our preschool, check up on our sick through phone calls and host some organizations like the American Red Cross.

Pandemics are no fun and they certainly are not helpful to institutions that are based on personal interactions. So, I want to give you some good



news. St. Timothy's is doing well. The financial commitment of our members has been exceptional. The lay leadership from the Vestry and Finance Team has really stepped up and gone the extra mile. Many of our lay leaders have taken on new and extra responsibilities to make sure we can continue to develop our broadcast capabilities in this new way of doing church. Others have found ways to decrease our expenses and raise additional revenue. We have had to do this because of lost revenue in other areas. It is a good sign for our future that we have been able to adapt to this changed environment.

My expectation is that we as a community are going to have to make even more changes in 2021. While some changes might be temporary others may be permanent. Some will be seen as steps forward (hiring a communications person to coordinate online worship), while others might be seen as steps backward. The reality is this is a time of increased change and we need to adapt and pivot towards the future. I don't know how things are going to look moving forward, but I am very happy that we have a leadership team in place that is committed to working with each other and committed to the health of St.Timothy's. That makes a big difference.

So, I want to assure everyone at St. Timothy's that even though things seem different now—it is not a usual September—we have the people and the resources in place to make sure that St. Timothy's stays strong and adapts to our changing circumstances. Our community is strong because we are connected and we care about each other. Even more, we continue to do ministry and care for the hurting and most vulnerable. This is our real strength and it makes all the difference in the world.

Vestry Notes - August 18th Meeting


At this Vestry meeting, financial issues were the main focus of discussion. Kent Miller, chairman of Stewardship, gave a presentation concerning the upcoming Stewardship Campaign which will begin in the fall. There is a plan to have an updated stewardship page on St. Timothy's website. You will soon hear more about the Campaign by letter, email, *The Word* and announcements.

Kathy Lombard, the Treasurer, gave a presentation on the 2021 Vision Budget, along with the current Treasurer's Report. She made a recommendation, with the support and research of the Finance Committee, that we participate in the Insured Cash Sweep program offered by Main Street Bank where St. Timothy's has its bank accounts. This program

insures money when the total of our accounts exceeds \$250,000 by automatically transferring the excess monies to other banks participating in the program. These monies will receive the same interest as we receive at Main Street Bank. The Vestry accepted the recommendation and voted to approve the plan. Kathy also recommended that Pay Pal be added to St. Timothy's donation page where Clover is also located. Pay Pal/Venmo appears to be more popular with donors. The Vestry agreed and made a motion to that effect, which was also approved by the Vestry.

Now More Than Ever - Our 2020 Agape for Haiti

September is here; a September unlike any we can remember. The year 2020 has been extraordinary in so many ways. We have felt the impacts of COVID-19, witnessed protests and climate change and marked the tenth anniversary of the earthquake in Haiti — the very beginning of St. Timothy's extraordinary relationship with St. Mathieu's school in Chapoteau. The help we have brought to the students and teachers in this remote mountain village (where there are no roads, no electricity, no running water) is a literal lifeline.

Even more extraordinary, though, are the relationships we have entered into, so many of which have been revealed this year to be two-way blessings. We receive emails from Pere Kesner Gracia (the Priest in Charge responsible for St. Mathieu's), Wilpha (the local lay eucharistic minister that St. Timothy's supported all the way through completion of his college degree), and the many other children and young adults we see when we visit (Ambioli, Werly, Monly, Luke, OB and many others). All of them write with prayers for us:

Werly writes, "My prayer are still with us every day cause God is our only hope. Know where[ever] you are, God are with you and protect you."

Pere Kesner Gracia writes, "Due to the worldwide disaster that is facing humanity, I am thinking of you and holding you in my daily prayers so that your family, friends and relatives be safe and protected until the pandemic Covid-19 pass away ...This is true, since we are all confined to our homes but our heart is not isolated from one another, we remain united in spirit, prayers and faith."

We could not have said it better ourselves.

We remain united in spirit, prayers and faith, no matter what happens in the world around us. We will not abandon the children of St. Mathieu's just because we ourselves are experiencing difficulties.

During three Sundays in September (13th, 20th, and 27th), St. Timothy's will hold its annual Agape fund-raising efforts to support St. Mathieu's school

(give online or by check, but please, give). You may remember from past years that we usually have this Agape fundraiser in May, but that was not possible this year. And even now, as our children in the U.S. and in Haiti plan their return to school, this event will be entirely virtual. We will protect each other while we work to raise the funds to protect the lives and education of our children in Haiti. Tune in to the Zoom service each week to see photos of our children, hear special messages from our friends in Haiti, and experience the faith and hope that come from being a part of something so much larger than our own problems — from being a part of God's will for the world.

Now, more than any time since the devastating earthquake ten years ago, our Haitian friends need our support. The political unrest, the drought and, now, an economic downturn caused by COVID-19 restrictions all cause even more stress on an already broken system. Your prayers and your financial support are the key to one more year of keeping our school open and the key to the extraordinary loving care of God that we at St. Timothy's have shown our friends in Haiti for over ten years.
