



The Lessons

A Reading from Acts 10:34-43

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."



If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

Holy Gospel: John 20:1-18

Celebrant: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. **People:** And also with you.


Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

Ways to Get Connected

All ministries welcome newcomers.

Please contact the church office at <u>office@saint-timothys.org</u> if you want more information about a particular ministry or would like to get involved.

Altar Guild – The Altar Guild is responsible for caring for the sanctuary (cleaning and maintaining the brass and linens), providing floral arrangements for the altar and elsewhere in the sanctuary, and preparing the elements for worship. Altar Guild members work in teams with one team being assigned to each Saturday of the month. Training is provided for new team members.

Buildings & Grounds – The Building and Grounds ministry is responsible for providing oversight and management for the care of the St. Timothy's property and associated systems (e.g., HVAC, plumbing, electrical etc.). Work is done on an as-needed basis based on the needs of the facility. This team especially needs members with prior building or grounds maintenance experience or general handyman skills.

Care Team – The St. Timothy's Care Team provides a touch of God's love to our St. Timothy's family and our local community. They send cards of support and prayers, phone calls for prayers, check-ins, and spiritual and in-home communion for those that are home bound.

Christian Education – The Christian Education Team works to develop Christ-centered people with biblical principles and equipping them with the knowledge and skills essential for expanding the Kingdom of God. This ministry provides planning and oversight of both adult and children's educational programs at St. Timothy's.

Communications – The Communication Team works to ensure consistency in St. Timothy's messaging across all communications channels. The ministry collaborates with other ministries and church leadership to ensure parishioners and the larger community are informed about events and developments at St. Timothy's. The Communications ministry includes the St. Isidore Guild, the team that provides technical support for livestreaming worship services. This ministry especially needs members with prior marketing, PR, or communications experience, including experience with website design and management, social media experience, and video production and services experience.

Community Engagement – The Community Engagement ministry was created in 2021 to engage the greater Herndon community and help St. Timothy's grow. They provide oversight for the community garden, Rooted in Herndon, built on the St. Timothy's campus as well as organize events to increase knowledge about and connection to St. Timothy's.

Fellowship – The Fellowship ministry is responsible for welcoming parishioners and newcomers to St. Timothy's. This ministry organizes various events, programs, and other activities throughout the year, including after-service coffee hours, to foster fellowship within the church and the wider community. Join the Fellowship ministry or just sign up to host coffee hour one Sunday.

Haiti Ministry - The St. Timothy's Haiti ministry supports the children of St. Mathieu's Episcopal School in Chapoteau, Haiti, located in the Central Plateau region. By pursuing long-term, sustainable improvements in their lives through education, we serve the poorest in our Hemisphere, fulfilling our baptismal vows to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves.

Latino Ministry – The Latino ministry yearns for a church that embodies the multiethnic, multilingual, and multicultural context we live in today. Our mission is to make known St Timothy's to Latino/Hispanic communities so that they may experience our church and embrace it as their spiritual home.

Music – The Music ministry of St. Timothy's seeks to glorify God through the gift of music, to inspire us all to greater service and to illuminate the spoken word in a manner which uplifts the congregation in their communal worship. This ministry includes the Adult Choir, the Bell Choir for special services, and guest musicians.

Preschool - St. Timothy's Pre-School provides educational experience for children ages two and a half through five. The preschool program is committed to meeting the individual needs and potential of each child in an interracial, non-denominational environment. St. Timothy's Preschool strives to develop creativity, self-confidence, and independence within each child.

Service Ministry - The St. Timothy's Service Ministry honors our baptismal covenant to respect the dignity of every person by exploring opportunities to assist those in need in the name of Jesus Christ. We channel St. Timothy's resources through education, financial campaigns and the collection of goods and services for worthy causes and organizations throughout the world.

Shawl Ministry – The Shawl ministry brings tangible gifts of God's love to people in need of comfort and solace, as well as to those who are celebrating births, baptisms, and other milestones of life. Our knitted and crocheted shawls, lap robes, baby blankets, hats, and scarves go out to persons in the church and to the wider community.

Stewardship – The Stewardship ministry provides an opportunity for the people of St. Timothy's to make a prayerful and intentional commitment of our *time, talent,* and *treasure* in gratitude for God's blessings in our lives and to further God's mission in the St. Timothy's community. The Stewardship ministry is also responsible for planning and executing the Annual Stewardship Campaign each fall.

Worship - The Worship committee, consisting of Vestry Liaison, Chair, and representatives from Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) and Lectors, Ushers, Altar Guild, Music, Latino ministry, and Saint Isidore Guild (Digital Ministry), coordinates with the clergy to plan services. LEMs serve at the altar during worship services to assist clergy in providing communion. Lectors (and LEMs) read the appointed scripture passages during worship. Ushers provide a warm welcome to parishioners and visitors alike, hand out the service bulletins, facilitate the collection, and help attendees find seating when necessary. As previously described, the Altar Guild and Music ministries and St. Isidore Guild are involved in the creation and production of worship services. The Latino ministry provides all planning and support for services conducted in Spanish.

St. Timothy's History

On November 1st, 1868, a few Episcopal Christians in a small dairy farm community in Herndon Virginia met together to worship and give thanks on that All Saints' Sunday. It was the first recorded service of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church. By 1872, a Sunday School with three teachers and seven students had been formed and a small building at the corner of Grace and Vine Streets, once used as a cheese factory, was acquired and renovated.

The first church building (now the Masonic Lodge at the corner of Elden and Grace Streets) was consecrated in June 1881, and the bell was hung in its steeple in 1882. St. Timothy's status reverted from church to mission and back again several times prior to World War II, but the church remained active thanks to the dedication of a few committed families, two faithful rectors, and students from the Episcopal Seminary in Alexandria. The need for a parish hall to house the ever-growing Sunday School, meetings and social gatherings, was of constant concern. So, the congregation raised funds with horse shows, rummage sales, and phantom auctions, and invested the proceeds in War Bonds. The parish hall was finally built in 1947.

Crowded conditions prevailed again during the 1950s, but it was the construction of Dulles Airport and the growth of Reston and Sterling Park in the early 1960s that compelled the Rev. John C. Henry and church leaders to plan seriously for major expansion. With more years of creative fundraising, ten acres of pasture was purchased and the structure which is now Henry Hall was built. Consecrated in 1969, it served as church, education building, and parish hall. Upholstered pews (constructed by parishioners) were moved aside after each service so the congregation could socialize and enjoy refreshments.

A strong tradition of liturgical music has been maintained throughout the church's history, thanks to the dedicated efforts of talented choir directors, organists, volunteer instrumentalists and choir. An antique two manual Tracker organ was acquired in 1972. A plaque detailing its acquisition and restoration is displayed on the narthex side of the instrument.

St. Timothy's also has a strong tradition of outreach, both within and beyond the community. The acclaimed preschool was founded in 1974. We welcome children of all faiths. The Closet, Herndon's highly successful used clothing outlet, had its beginnings at St. Timothy's in the 1970s. A young deacon initiated the first shelter for the homeless in Fairfax County in 1984. Volunteers set up cots and provided dinners in Henry Hall. Other churches joined in the effort, which continued until the Embry Rucker Shelter was built in nearby Reston. Pre-COVID, we also engaged in annual mission trips to the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota and Chapoteau, Haiti. St. Timothy's continues to provide financial support for the children of St. Mathieu's School in Chapoteau. The congregation also supports Cornerstones, LINK (an ecumenical food ministry), Helping Hungry Kids, the Hypothermia Shelter,

children and youth with special needs, Episcopal Relief and Development, and many other noteworthy Christian ventures.

The present sanctuary, which seats 350, was consecrated November 11, 1982. The baptismal font and hymn boards date from the late 19th century. The bell from the 1881 church building has been electrified and continues to ring before every Sunday service and major holy day as it has for more than a century.

Just as St. Timothy's grew and benefitted from the opening of Dulles Airport and the regional growth that accompanied it, we expect to grow and benefit from the impending opening of the Herndon metro stop. Coupled with the arrival of our new priest-in-charge, The Rev. Charles R. Cowherd, and a return to "normalcy" after years of the COVID pandemic, we are excited and energized to see where God takes us next.

By the grace of God St. Timothy's seeks to be a vibrant, luminous, and faithful witness to the love of God in Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit until Christ comes again, and God's Kingdom is established forever.
