

To the good people of St. Timothy's,

At the time of this writing, it looks like the Washington Commanders are <u>less</u> likely to be building a football stadium nearby us here at St. Timothy's. A potential site in Loudoun County <u>would</u> have made us the closest Episcopal church at only 3 miles away!

I mention that because, even with the noisy construction improvements on the sidewalk along Van Buren Street, our campus remains such a beautiful spot of calm and peace amidst all the hustle and bustle of the area. The rolling green hills, the outside Chapel, and now our Community Garden all serve as an oasis for the surrounding community and for our parish. I give



thanks to all those whose hard work and careful stewardship of our physical campus over many decades have made that so.

The name of our new Community Garden is "Rooted in Herndon" and thus the garden serves as a reminder of all that St. Timothy's has been for this community over 150 years (both at the old church and here on Spring and Van Buren). We are rooted in the very soil of this community. We toil hard to build up God's kingdom, to nurture the growth of Christ's love, and to spread the bounty of the Holy Spirit with all we come into contact with.

My sense is that Herndon and Reston will continue to build UP, perhaps not with a new football stadium but with new office buildings and condos and apartments. My hope and prayer is that as those buildings go up, that we continue to connect OUTWARD, that our roots are strengthened with our existing partnerships, and that we develop new connections with other folks in our area. In all, I hope that our campus remains a beautiful spot for visitors to walk their dogs through, for our children to play in, and for our church to connect with God and each other.

Jesus said "I am the vine and you are the branches" (John 15.5) and that image can serve as a guiding one for what St. Timothy's can be in this community and the role that our campus might play in that. (FYI: there is nothing, of course, inherently wrong with tall buildings but they do tend to face spectacularly bad ends in both Old and New Testaments!)

I invite you to come and enjoy our grounds as the weather stays cool and the flowers are in beautiful bloom. Ponder how deep St. Timothy's has planted itself in this community and what future growth might be achieved in the years to come.

Report from the Vestry

Dear Friends.

The Vestry held its monthly meeting on May 17th at 7:00 p.m. at the church. The meeting was run by Charles. Sandy Schanne also attended.

Kathy Lombard, Treasurer, reported that St. Timothy's received \$41,025 in pledged and identified offerings in April which was more than the amount of budgeted income per month (\$34,350). This helps to reduce our 2022 budget deficit. Actual giving at this rate will not erase the deficit entirely but, if continued, makes a real difference. Kathy also informed the vestry that St. Timothy's qualifies for a tax credit (Employee Retention Credit) for wages paid to non-clergy staff who were retained while church operations were restricted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Charles discussed church staff transitions, the upcoming election of the new Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia at the Special Convention to be held on June 4, 2022, the blessing of the "Rooted in Herndon" community garden and bilingual service, the June organ recital, Covenantal Giving, and the Worship Committee. Charles expressed thanks to Betsy Bosworth and Carolyn Hamm, the Co-Senior Wardens and Maria LaWalt, Junior Warden, and others for their continued support throughout the busy first weeks of his call to St. Timothy's.

A report on buildings and grounds was submitted. A report was also submitted by the Communications Ministry on itemized expenditures from the generous gifts made to St. Isidore Guild totaling \$44,535 for audio-visual systems for streaming and recording services at St. Timothy's. Most of the work is completed and well within budget. Expenditures to date have been \$30,420 for purchase of the mounted cameras, microphones, lighting, computer technology, and other equipment. Carolyn noted the need for an event planning form and Sandy reported on the need to revive periodic calendar planning meetings to coordinate church and ministry events.

After discussion at the meeting, the vestry approved by email ballot after the meeting a motion by Carolyn Hamm to authorize the church bookkeeper to pay specified contractual invoices without an approved voucher except when such invoices contain additional charges.

The Examen

In conjunction with the request from Father Charles to look at the "sails" which adorn the ceiling of St. Timothy's and perhaps ascribing each of them to the disciples, I began to look around for other "signs" of our beliefs and how they could be represented by designs, etc, which adorn our church. As I was sitting contemplating the Altar and the Sanctuary a few Sundays ago, I realized I was seeing something in the pattern of the stained glass dove above the retable behind the altar. My examination had revealed that there are five parts to the representation of this gentle bird which has signified peace and forgiveness for centuries. At first, I thought of the joy that Noah must have realized when the dove returned with the olive twig in its beak after many anxious days with his family and the animals in the Ark and without any sign of land, but that did not really inspire me and I had something else in my mind, but it was not until I returned home and was looking in one of my many notebooks for a prayer, that I was able to realize that the five components of the stained glass panels reminded me of the five points of "The Examen," an evening instruction written by St. Ignatius Loyola as a process for reflecting upon your day.

Working from left to right, the two sections of each wing recalled the following:

- 1. Remember God's presence.
- 4. Repent of your failings.
- 2. Respond to Him with thanks.
- 5. Resolve to grow (in faith).

Reflect on how God showed Himself.

The unnumbered 3 represents the "head" of the dove which contains the Pyramid representing the Trinity of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

I find these thoughts prepare me for worship while in church and in my mind when at home in the evening when I think of the successes and failures of the day. I have two lovely icons created at the Greek Orthodox Church in Walsingham, Norfolk, England by one of the few "licensed" icon painters in Britain. I find having a picture in front of me helps my concentration and also inspires prayer and peace.

Does anyone else see anything in St. Timothy's that inspires them in thought and/or prayer?

We are becoming a new and *re*-formed church, the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement individuals, small gathered communities and congregations whose way of life is the way of Jesus and his way of love,

no longer centered on empire and establishment, no longer fixated on preserving institutions, no longer shoring up white supremacy or anything else that hurts or harms any child of God.

By God's grace ...

... WE ARE BECOMING A CHURCH THAT LOOKS AND ACTS LIKE JESUS.

What does this re-formation look like in practice?

We'll know we're moving forward when we...

- 1. **Center on Jesus Christ**. His teachings, his example, his Spirit, his way of love and his way of life are the key to having loving, liberating and life-giving relationships with God, our neighbors, all of creation, and ourselves.
- 2. **Practice the selfless, self-giving way of the cross**. The way of "cruciform love"—Jesus' act of unselfish, sacrificial, self-offering love, or losing one's life in order to gain it— is our way to authentic life.
- 3. **Unite around the practice of a rule of life in small gathered communities**. These kinds of groups—small circles of people who support each other in following Jesus with intention and accountability— are necessary for cultivating Christ-centered life.
- 4. **Reclaim our Christian identity as a Spirit-driven, countercultural, underground movement**. We must break free of the church's identification with domination systems, empire, establishment, privilege, and social and cultural traditions that have held us captive— and get back in touch with the risk-taking, liberating ways of Jesus.
- 5. **Live and bear bold witness to the vision and values of Jesus**. We point to the reality of the kingdom (the peaceable reign) of God, and we seek to embody the beloved community, where each person strives for and celebrates the dignity and flourishing of every beloved child of God as much as we do for ourselves.
