THE SUNDAY OF THE PASSION – PALM SUNDAY

(Please gather in Henry Hall with palms)

Liturgy of the Palms (BCP 270)

Celebrant: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord.

People: Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Gospel Reading: Matthew 21:1-11

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them

on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven! "When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

The Blessing Over the Branches (BCP 271)

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. **People:** And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Celebrant: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

People: Hosanna in the highest.

The Procession

Celebrant: Let us go forth in peace.

People: In the name of Christ. Amen.

Please process into the Sanctuary waving palms in triumphant entrance.

The Collect for the Day (BCP 168)

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. **People:** And with thy spirit.

Celebrant: Almighty and everlasting God, who, of thy tender love towards mankind, hast sent thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our flesh, and to suffer death upon the cross, that all mankind should follow the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may both follow the example of his patience, and also be made partakers of his resurrection; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lessons

A Reading from Isaiah 50:4-9a

The Lord GOD has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakens--wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. The Lord GOD has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death--even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew 27:11-54

The congregation reads the part of the crowd.

Narrator: Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him,

Pilate: "Are you the king of the Jews?"

Narrator: Jesus said,

Jesus: "You say so."

Narrator: But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then

Pilate said to him,

Pilate: "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?"

Narrator: But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was

greatly amazed. Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner,

called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them,

Pilate: "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is call the

Messiah?"

Narrator: For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he

was sitting on the judgement seat, his wife sent word to him.

Pilate's Wife: "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal

because of a dream about him."

Narrator: Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and

to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them,

Pilate: "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?"

Congregation: "Barabbas."

Narrator: Pilate said to them,

Pilate:: "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?"

Narrator: All of them said,

Congregation: "Let him be crucified!"

Narrator: Then he asked,

Pilate: "Why, what evil has he done?"

Narrator: But they shouted all the more,

Congregation: "Let him be crucified!"

Narrator: So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he

took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying,

Pilate: "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves."

Narrator: Then the people as a whole answered,

Congregation: "His blood be on us and on our children!"

Narrator: So he released Barabbas for them, and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to

be crucified. Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's

headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him.

Soldiers: "Hail, King of the Jews!"

Narrator:

They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

(At the mention of Golgotha, the congregation should stand and remain standing for the remainder of the reading.)

Narrator:

As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,

Bystander:

"You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross."

Narrator:

In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying,

Chief Priests:

"He saves others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son."

Narrator:

The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way. From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o' clock Jesus cried with a loud voice,

Jesus:

"Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?"

Narrator:

that is,

Jesus:

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Narrator:

At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said,

Bystander:

"Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him."

Narrator:

Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and

the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said,

Centurion: "Truly this man was God's Son!"

Please stand, or kneel, as you are able.

He made there a full and perfect sacrifice for the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks to thee, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

HOLY WEEK at ST. TIMOTHY's 2023

From early times Christians have observed the week before Easter as a time of special devotion. Jerusalem contained many sacred places that were sites for devotion and liturgy and numerous pilgrims to the holy city followed the path of Jesus in his last days. They formed processions, worshipped where Christ suffered and died, and venerated relics. From this beginning evolved the rites we observe today for Holy Week. These services provide a liturgical experience of the last days of Jesus' earthly life, as well as the time and events leading up to his as the resurrection. All are invited to join in these experiences as a way of re-membering and re-embodying the Easter story.

Maundy Thursday 4/6, 7 pm (also livestreamed)

The Thursday in Holy Week is the start of the Triduum, the three holy days before Easter. It comes from the Latin *mandatum novum*, "new commandment," from John 13:34. Maundy Thursday celebrations commemorate the institution of the eucharist by Jesus "on the night he was betrayed." The Prayer Book liturgy provides for celebration of the eucharist and, in preparation for the next day, the altar is stripped and all decorative furnishings are removed from the church.

Good Friday- Friday 4/7, 7 pm (also livestreamed)

The Friday before Easter Day is the day on which the church commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus. It is a day of fasting and special acts of discipline and self-denial. The liturgy of the day includes John's account of the Passion gospel, a solemn form of intercession known as the solemn collects (dating from ancient Rome), and devotions before the cross (commonly known as the veneration of the cross).

Easter Vigil- Saturday 4/8, 7 pm (Spanish-Speaking)

The liturgy, also known as the Great Vigil, is intended as the first celebration of Easter. The service begins in darkness, sometime between sunset on Holy Saturday and sunrise on Easter, and consists of 4 parts: Service of Light (kindling of new fire & lighting the Paschal candle); Service of Lessons; Baptism; and the Eucharist. This liturgy recovers the ancient practice of keeping the Easter feast where believers would gather in the hours of darkness to hear scripture and offer prayer. It anticipates the baptisms that would come at first light and links the meanings of Christ's dying & rising to our own baptisms.

Easter Sunday- Sunday 4/9, 8 am and 10 am (also livestreamed)

Easter is the principal festival of the church year, in both day and season, and is celebrated on Easter Sunday as the annual feast of the resurrection, the *pascha* or Christian Passover, and the eighth day of cosmic creation. Easter sets the experience of springtime next to the ancient stories of deliverance and the proclamation of the risen Christ. In the west, Easter occurs on the first Sunday after the full moon on or after the vernal equinox. Easter always falls between Mar. 22 and Apr. 25 inclusive. Following Jewish custom, the feast begins at sunset on Easter Eve with the Great Vigil of Easter (see above). Faith in Jesus' resurrection on the third day following his crucifixion is at the heart of Christian belief.
