


Dear St. Timothy's Family,

Do you have a passion for creation care? A desire for environmental action? Do you have skills in waste management? Do you have the ability to lift around 40 lbs. and reliable transportation? If so, have I got a deal for you!

Earlier this year, St. Timothy's cancelled the recycling portion of our contract with our waste management company. The Vestry made that decision because our recycling bins (see pictured) had repeatedly been used by "neighbors" as trash receptacles. This caused the recycling inside those bins to be compromised and it also tended to create an unsightly mess to be cleaned up by someone (usually Andy Hamm)



Given the situation, we decided that it was prudent not to be paying money (around \$1000/year) for our recycling NOT to be recycled and for this litter situation to persist on our front lawn. The Vestry, of course, lamented that this would jeopardize our ability to recycle—specifically our paper waste. The Preschool shared that concern and promised to find its own solutions for its recyclables. "Upstairs" also remained committed to recycling. As of now, this consists of an individual taking the large white oblong recycling receptacles to their home and putting them in their personal recycle bins (See attached).





I am writing to ask if anyone would like to participate in this effort. The job description is in *italics* above. (And there indeed might even be a solution beyond the current one.)

(By the way, in other trash news, the Church had previously purchased a lock for the gated dumpster to prevent folks from filling up our dumpster with their home trash. This means that every week on trash day, we go and unlock the dumpster so that the waste management company can get to it. And our cleaning company does the same whenever they use it. A key exists in the kitchen for all groups [internal or external] to access the dumpsters and dispose of their event's trash.)

I have intentionally offered the above belabored description to iterate the complexities of St. Timothy's campus and building. We have 8 acres of a beautiful and inviting (and entirely porous) campus. We have a large building with a

growing church and a Preschool. We have a worshipping congregation, Holy Trinity Catholic Parish, which rents our space on Sunday mornings and a Dance company that does the same on Monday through Wednesday. We have more than a dozen recovery groups that meet at various times all throughout the building. We have a Boy Scout Troop with weekly meetings and a Red Cross Blood Drive occurring every other month.

We also have all sorts of visitors throughout the week, drop-ins and randoms, those seeking financial assistance and those whose needs are even deeper.

This all means that we are a vital hub of the social fabric in the Herndon community. But it also means that it puts no small strain on the building and our staff. As our church grows back in numbers, this reality will increase. (For example, more people worshipping over the weekend means more bulletins, which means more recycling trips by our prospective recycler.) Know that we are always looking for folks to "chip in" in a variety of ways.

In closing, and returning to our recycling situation, I know that previously St. Timothy's had someone who carried the (somewhat grandiose?) title of *Steward of Creation*. I will avoid that title and, for the opposite reason, that of "volunteer." Rather, does a "disciple" or a "servant" among us feel called in this direction?





Psychology and Spirituality

True Self, False Self, the Holy Spirit and Pentecost

Genesis tells us that we have been created in the "image and likeness of God." One of the early Fathers of the Church explained this to mean that God's image is implanted within us at birth and that our life's goal is to develop that image into the likeness of God, becoming ever more like God. This leads me to think about two 20th century thinkers, one a psychologist and the other a Trappist monk.

Carl Jung (1875-1961) is noteworthy in the history of psychology for developing the concept of the "Self." In his thinking, the Self occurs when material from our unconscious is brought into the light of consciousness. The resulting Self moves us beyond our egos by allowing us to incorporate hitherto unconsidered material from the unconscious; we are enlarged beyond our egos by finding ways to make real our unconscious dreams, hopes, visions for the future and previously unconsidered pathways for our lives. Jung emphasized that the process of developing the Self was an ongoing journey into ever increasing self-knowledge and actualization.

Thomas Merton (1915-1968) directly or indirectly built upon Jung's concept of the Self through spiritual writing in which he introduced the concept of the True Self (TS) and the False Self (FS). For Merton, the TS is that part of us that is aligned with God and God's plan for ourselves and the world. In contrast, the False Self is that part of us that pursues goals other than those that are aligned with God's vision for us and the world (e.g., consumerism careerism, an us vs. them mentality). Like Jung, Merton also taught that the process of moving away from the FS and aligning ourselves ever more with the TS was a lifelong journey of spiritual development.

It is not surprising that two thinkers from two different perspectives emphasize in their own ways the notions of ongoing growth and development. To grow and change (to ripen in fullness) is the essence of being human, and indeed the essence of all life. These ideas may have a special resonance for us during this long season of Pentecost, in which we recall the growth and development of the early Church as portrayed in the Acts of the Apostles. An obvious link between our spiritual growth and the season of Pentecost is the gift of the Sprit. St. Paul tells us that the Sprit is more intimate to me than I am to myself. This is not only a good description of what Merton means by the TS, but is also the basis for the Church's theology of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

For it is always and everywhere, the initiative of the Sprit within me that allows spiritual growth to occur. Or in other words, it is myself in union with and aligned with God that propels me to become more like God. It is only by the grace of the Spirit that we know who our True Self is, and only by the grace of the Spirit that we can overcome the lure of the False Self and find a way to actualize the "good news" in our world. Perhaps one way for us to approach the season of Pentecost is to ask ourselves some questions: where in our lives do we find

conflict between our true self and our false self, where are we on our spiritual journey to become more like God, where are we being called to implement God's vision in our families, our workplaces, our church and our society? What impedes that journey and where do we need the breath of the Holy Spirit to enflame more deeply our true self so that we can better align ourselves with God's work in the world?

Let us pray:

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. And you shall renew the face of the earth.
