Dear St. Timothy's Family,

In my family, we refer to the dreariness and cold associated with this time of year as "the JanFebs." This is the portion of the calendar that has the holiday season firmly in the rearview mirror, and the promise of Spring still a few months away. For Christians, of course, Lent—a time of preparation and penitence—is also on the horizon. To add to it all, in 2024, we will even observe Ash Wednesday on Valentine's Day.

Your Rector's WORD article for this month does not offer any reprieve to these "JanFebs" as I will use this space to talk about the following items in our church life:

Funerals, our Endowment, and our Columbarium.

1) On the bottom of the "Sacraments" page¹ of our church website, there is a section related to Funeral preparation at St. Timothy's. There, one can find links to two documents: first, a <u>Funeral Planning Guide</u> and then a <u>Family Information</u> Form. Both provide lots of information about how to plan for a loved one's funeral as well as to think about one's own. Please consider taking a look, and even filling out for yourself what hymns/lessons, etc. that you would want at your

burial service. Questions like: "do I want Rite I or Rite II? Casket or urn? Communion or not?" can also be answered. You can return that document to the church, and we will have it on file for if, or rather when,

the day comes. Your family will thank you from beyond the veil! Far from being dreary, folks often find funeral preparation to be a liberating experience!

If you have any questions, please feel free to set up a meeting with me (priest@saint-timothys.org) to discuss these matters.

2) Inevitably, discussions related to death and dying lead to questions related to one's estate and how to pass on one's worldly possessions. (If you thought that transition was forced, I refer you to the instructions related to wills, etc., in our Prayer Book. Found on page 445, it comes at the end of the section related to "A Thanksgiving for the Birth of a Child"!)

St. Timothy's first created its Endowment Fund in 2000 to provide parishioners with the means to support the parish's long-term future. Guided by Deke Smith, the Endowment Committee looks to grow the Fund so that St. Timothy's can continue supporting its ministries here in Herndon and worldwide. The average Endowment Fund for churches in our Diocese is about \$500,000; Saint Tim's is currently \$131,500. I encourage you to consider St. Timothy's and the Endowment Fund in your estate plans. 3) Finally, I wanted to write briefly about the Columbarium located inside the Sanctuary. A columbarium is: "a room, building, or wall that is designated for the interment of the ashes of people who have died and been cremated." Here is a more detailed description of the St. Timothy's Columbarium taken from the original brochure:

The columbarium provides a dignified and economical alternative to in-ground burials. It is located in the middle low wall, to the left, as you enter the sanctuary, as shown in the picture on the back panel. There are 90 niches which measure 8 " \times 8 " \times 16 " deep. Each niche holds one or two urns. Each niche has a marble cover plate which is engraved, much like a traditional gravestone, with individual dates of birth and death.

The Columbarium contains the cremated remains of over 20 former parishioners and members of the St. Timothy's community. It is a powerful reminder of that "great cloud of witnesses" that joins with us, past, present, and future in the communion of saints. If you want to know more about the Columbarium, please

The "JanFebs" can indeed be a gloomy time, as can all this talk about death and dying. I will close then by quoting from pg. 507 of the *Book of Common Prayer*. Here lies the so-called Price Rubric, named after Charles Price (1920-1999), one of the primary authors of the 1979 prayerbook. The "Price Rubric" appears at the end of the burial rites, and eloquently describes the Anglican theology on grief, death, and the resurrection:

The liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we too, shall be raised.

The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

The Closet Board met on January 17, 2024 for its quarterly Board meeting. At that meeting we learned that in 2023:

- -The Closet 2023 income was just over \$1,200,000 a new record
- -The Closet gave \$154,250 in grants to community non-profits
- -The Closet gave out \$118,355 in voucher money to help those in need (clothing, shoes, housewares, toys)
- -The Closet provided \$44,000 total in scholarships to 6 area high schools:

 Herndon High School, South Lakes High School, Westfield High School, Dominion High School, Park View High School and Mountain View Alternative High School.

Grant money from the last quarter of 2023 was distributed to All Ages Read Together, Shepherd Center and Stroke Comeback Center.

The Board also voted to send a benevolence check in the amount of \$500 to each of the Congregations that support The Closet.

It is the support of the community who shop and donate at the store and the congregations who provide volunteers that make The Closet a success. It must be noted that The Closet Manager and Staff are to be congratulated to a very successful year.
