At our Annual Meeting in January, I announced, as one of my three priorities for the calendar year, the idea of "Joy in '24." Conscious that we were entering the quadrennial presidential election, I wanted to be intentional about St. Timothy's maintaining ourselves as a parish family and remaining connected to God as the source of joy in our lives.

I was concerned, and am still concerned, about the corrosive political rhetoric in our culture and the divisiveness that it spawns. Although I have not really experienced it within our community, we are in the "Stretch run" to November and thus I hope and pray that we continue as "One St. Timothy's"—even despite real differences in our political lives as citizens/ congregants.

My idea for "Joy in 2024" also involved engaging ourselves in the larger world around us, to find ways to connect with our political institutions outside of our church and to talk within our church about the issues that face us all. The latter involved a series in the Spring on "Faith and Politics" and a book study on the book by the same name. We will continue that conversation in the Fall with another series "Faith and Politics 2.0" in the leadup to the election. Be on the lookout for more details regarding that offering.


In terms of interacting across the "church-state" divide, I would say I was flattered at the beginning of the year with an invitation to deliver the invocation in Richmond at State Capitol for the Virginia House of Delegates. As the year progressed, such invitations persisted... and it became very clear, in an election year, that politicians were very keen on inviting faith leaders for lunches, coffees, roundtables, conversations, etc.!

Of particular interest have been meetings with CORNERSTONES concerning the homeless encampment on the "Hill" in Reston. I would like to highlight a couple more:

- 2) Then, coming up at the end of this month, I have been invited to serve as a panelist for the Town of Herndon, Mayoral Debate (see the accompanying flyer above), on September 30th. If you have any questions for the candidates, please let me know in advance.
- 3) Finally, mark your calendar for **Sunday October 20th**, **2024**, **at 2 pm** as our local clergy group will be planting a "Democracy Tree" in Herndon. Details will be forthcoming but there will be an interfaith liturgy and representatives from many of our local places of worship participating and in attendance.

As you can see it's a busy time, but I hope that we can all make the effort to maintain "Joy in '24" as a priority for this year.

St. Timothy's and Cornerstones Partnership

Did you know that St. Timothy's is a "Sponsoring Religious Organization" and holds a seat on the Cornerstones' Board of Directors? This allows St. Timothy's the opportunity to engage with our neighbors in our community in a much broader sense than we can on our own. Through our financial donations (the Vestry included \$2,000 from our 2024 annual budget in support) and our "gifts in kind," this is some of the work Cornerstones does in our community:

- Operates the Embry Rucker Community Shelter, aiding 615 individuals with services, and supported housing for 45.
- Through the Hypothermia Prevention program, hosts an average of 59 individuals per night, offering a warm place to sleep and a hot meal from December 1st March 31st.
- Through the FREE from Hunger Center and the Cornerstones Pantry Program, distributed 165,000 lbs. of food and essentials to families and individuals.
- Provides affordable childcare through the Laurel Learning Center.
- Donated over 1,600 backpacks to over 300 students heading back to school.
- Collected and distributed over 1,000 winter coats and provided Gift Cards for Kids to more than 1,436 children and 124 senior citizens.
- Provided over \$4 million in rental, food and other assistance to community members in need.
- Provided over 9,000 volunteer hours to community initiatives addressing systemic issues through the Herndon Neighborhood Resource Center and other community connected sites.

The Closet: Growing Up with the Community

Since its founding in 1974, The Closet's voucher program has been a key aspect of the nonprofit thrift shop's community outreach. One reason local congregations wanted to establish a consolidated community thrift shop, rather than individual clothes closets at various houses of worship, was to serve the influx of Vietnamese refugees fleeing that war-torn nation. And in those early days, if The Closet didn't have appropriate clothing items available, such as undergarments, clients were directed to a local shop to find them, at The Closet's expense.

As The Closet approaches the 50th anniversary of its founding this fall, the voucher program continues to grow and expand, its clientele a reflection of our very diverse community. Clients are referred by local government and nonprofit social service agencies or our member congregations. In 2023 alone, the voucher program distributed more than \$118,000 in clothing and household goods, serving approximately 2,000 people per session (spring/summer and fall/winter). What an amazing resource for those in need, supported by our bighearted shoppers, generous donors, caring volunteers and hardworking staff!
