


Dear St. Timothy's Family,

Lent will begin this year, as it does every year, with Ash Wednesday. On Wednesday March 5th, we will have services at 12:15 pm (Spoken service, note the time change from last year's 12 pm) and at 7 pm (with Choir, Livestreamed.) Ash Wednesday is one of our most solemn services of the year (as it begins the penitential season) and one of the most public (because you get an ash on your forehead!) I invite you to attend either in person or online to one of those services.

I want to use this space to say a little about what Lent means in our church calendar and in our lives together.



On Sundays, you will notice that our sanctuary and worship service will adopt significant changes. The frontals and vestments will change from the vibrant green of Epiphany (or radiant white of Baptism) to the more somber and reserved purple. That color symbolizes the pain and suffering that Christ endured on his way to the cross. Paradoxically, it also is the traditional color for royalty. Therefore, it also points to the Resurrection, and our hopeful preparation for rebirth at Easter, while reminding us of Christ's sovereignty in heaven.

In keeping with the Lenten mood of penitence and reflection, the Altar Guild will also refrain from flowers in the church, using simpler and sparser arrangements.

On the 1st Sunday of Lent (March 9, 2025), we will say/sing the Great Litany at the beginning of the



service. This extended, deeply penitential, prayer serves as an inflection point that marks the beginning of the Lenten Season, particularly if you were not able to attend on Ash Wednesday,

All throughout Lent, you will notice additionally changes in our liturgy. At the beginning of the service, we will start with the Penitential Order (*Book of Common Prayer*, pg. 319) which includes the Confession. This orients us, from the beginning, towards a posture of humility and contrition. The word "Alleluia" is, of course, excised from the service. (Please do not feel too bad if one "slips out"!) We also say/sing the *Kyrie* (with its focus on mercy) rather than the *Gloria* (or some other more praiseworthy prayer) as a part of our service music. Finally, the lessons and hymnody will also reflect the Lenten atmosphere.

This all sounds somewhat "doom and gloomy." On many of these Sundays, we will have newcomers who are trying out our church (oftentimes folks want to seek out a church before Easter) and I find myself almost apologizing for the bleak outlook. There is, though, a great joy in Lent, not only obviously in the Easter hope at its conclusion, but also in the very act of going through Lent's disciplines. It is hard, but so is life. It is difficult, but this world is difficult. My Ash Wednesday sermon usually ends with that note: putting the ash on is not a form of disfigurement but an acknowledgment of who we are in front of God. Nothing then is more beautiful than a somber Lenten hymn, or a child with ash on their forehead, or any of us stripping ourselves down in front of Creator who loves us still the same.

Lenten Adult Forum

Psychology and Spirituality 3.0: *Demystifying Mysticism*. These sessions will focus on the longstanding Christian tradition of contemplative prayer and mysticism, seeking to show how these are not reserved to a special few, but in fact a call to all Christians. We will begin with an understanding of the psychological roots of contemplative prayer/mysticism, while discussing practical ways to approach these activities. We will also look at the lives and teachings of several important mystics in the history of the church to glean how their experiences may enrich our own. The series will begin on March 9, the first Sunday of Lent at 9:00 AM in the church and will continue at that time for a total of 5 weeks.

Would you like to drive with HVN? If you are age 25 or older with an excellent driving record, you are eligible to serve as a volunteer HVN driver. Volunteers undergo vetting, and HVN pays for secondary car insurance. It's so easy and flexible, as you decide how often you would like to help and select from a number of ride requests via an automated system.
